wiki Waterhouse's second album, Memoir of a Sparklemuffin, sounds whimsical if you don't know what a sparklemuffin is. It's a cute but terrifying itsy-bitsy spider that cannibalises its partner if it doesn't like their mating dance. Brutal. But there's no need to read between the lines about Waterhouse's relationship with Robert Pattinson. The songs on here are inspired by Bloc Party, soundtracks from '90s movies like Clueless and motherhood (she gave birth in March). It's glittery, rocky, sad, tense, indie and a little bit dance-y—all the good stuff. Out September 13.

Another anticipated new release comes from Bob Dylan and The Band. OG fans and anyone anticipating the Dylan biopic, A Complete Unknown starring Timothée Chalamet and Elle Fanning will appreciate this box set of live recordings from 1974. With 27 CDs and 431 songs (417 of which have never been released), it's the perfect immersive fan experience or newbie catch-up collection. Out September 20.

BITTERSWEET, BY LOTTE BOWSER

Lotte Bowser was plunged into everyone's worst nightmare when her boyfriend Ben died. COVID had hit while the couple was seeking treatment for his rare cancer, leaving Lotte even further isolated in her grief. Four years on, she's found a path forward and shares how joy and grief can exist simultaneously. She also hosts The Lemonade Podcast about resilience. \$19.99 (Little A), out October 1.



MADAM, BY ANTONIA MURPHY

Antonia Murphy was living on a farm in New Zealand when her husband left her. With two kids, she needed to figure out a way to make money - so she opened an ethical escort agency and became a part-time pimp. Her memoir of the turbulent early years has already been adapted for television, with Rachel Griffiths playing Antonia, airing in early 2025. \$34.99 (Simon & Schuster), out October 30.
